TENTH ANNUAL OLD TIME RANCH TOUR

Sunday July 17, 1960

A trip northest of Laramie, past the Wheatland Reservoir and on to the Palmer Canyon (Hall Ranch) thence to the Mule Shoe and a trib a Ranches of the Swan Land & Cattle Company and back on Highway 34 to Laramie.

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Key to Map

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This tour is sponsored by the Albany County Historical Society, the University of Wyoming Summer School, the Kiwanis Club, and the Wyoming and Denver Westerners.

The tour has been arranged by Dr. Robert H. Burns, A. S. Gillespie, George Berges, Bill Riedl, Wesley Seamands, and Mr. and Mrs. Forrest S. Blunk.

The route is over country roads with some high centers, and drivers are cautioned to take care that modern cars do not scrape the high centers. By riding the centers the cars with low clearance will not hit these centers. There are a few rocky high centers on the route for this year. Generally speaking the roads will be good.

This year the tour will visit ranches in the northern part of Albany County, then travel east to Sybille Creek, and follow the valley of the Sybille. Stops will be made at the Wheatland Reservoir; the Ralph A. Hall Ranch, where the queen will be crowned; and the Old Mule Shoe Ranch, on the Sybille Creek, where the Wolfjen family settled. (A daughter of that family married the late Senator John B. Kendrick, large cattle and ranch owner, who served as Governor and U. S. Senator for a period of time.) The tour will then be conducted to the Old Two Bar Ranch which has been making history on the Sybille Creek for almost a century. At one time it was the main cattle ranch for the Swan Land and Cattle Company which owned the largest number of cattle in the state of Wyoming during its peak days. From there we will go back onto oil road on Highway 34. The next stop will be at the Jones Ranch which was owned by the Swan Brothers first, and then went into the ownership of the Swan Land and Cattle Company. From there we will continue up the Sybille Creek. If time permits, two additional stops will be made along Highway 34. The first will be at the Old Langhof Ranch, now Martens, at the right side of the road along the creek, which was the site of a rustling incident in the early days. The next tentative stop will be at the Fitzmorris Ranch which lies to the left, close to the road. This was a part of the Swan holdings and is one of the first ranches of this area. We will continue on up the Sybille Creek to the divide and go through the Morton Pass, where you will notice to your right about half a mile or more, a grove of trees which are the Sybille Springs. These with Plumbago Creek make up the head waters of the main Sybille.

Leaving the Morton Pass the caravan will cross a bridge, and to the left, close by, will be seen two caves. In June of about 1901 a dead man was found in one of those caves. He perished in a blizzard when he attempted to walk from the Iconoclas Mine, near the head of Halleck Canyon, to Laramie. He went into that cave for shelter, and sat down on a ledge in the rear of the cave. The place was about the size of a small sitting room chair. He evidently went to sleep and never awakened. His overcoat was over his knees and he was in such a position that he could not fall over.

Just to the west of those caves, less than three-quarters of a mile is where S. W. Gillespie killed the last buffalo in southeastern Wyoming, in July 1881. To the left, above the caves about a quarter of a mile, is where Plumbago Canyon comes out of the hills, and is where the Radichal family settled in about 1887. That property still belongs to the family.

The Swan Land and Cattle Company round-up wagon used to make camp close to where the bridge now stands, as did the Coble round-up wagon which worked with the Swan Land and Cattle Company. In 1901, the largest bunch of cattle that was ever gathered in one drive, in this century, was brought onto the round-up grounds. There were three thousand and five hundred head. It took two and a half days to sort that bunch of cattle for brands, and to cut out the beef steers.

The Swan Land and Cattle Company's brand, in the beginning, was a horse-shoe on the left side and two horizontal bars on the left hip, and "under-bits" in each ear. Tom Swan acquired the horse-shoe brand from Aunt Mary Earhardt, who lived just north of what is now the Diamond Horseshoe Motel.

The Coble brand was a half diamond over an E on the left side of the cattle. They also used a half diamond over a Z on the left hip on a large number of their cattle. For an ear mark they cropped the right ear and under half-cropped the left. At one time they put a wattle in the center of the forehead. To do this they would make a "V-shaped" slit down the center of the skull, leaving a piece of skin hanging. It would draw and shrivel up until it looked round in appearance. This "V-shaped" slit would be about three-fourths of an inch wide and about three inches long.

After leaving the bridge we soon come to a graveled highway on the left which is the Old Wheatland Road, coming out of Plumbago Canyon, the site of the Radichal Ranch. Looking south and to the left along the Laramie range, one sees the clefts of three canyons sloping to the west. These are, in order: Gate Creek, Middle Creek, and most prominent, Wall Rock Canyon, early-day hangout for the wolf pack.

Looking to the right one can see the big ranch which was settled by an Englishman named Boughton, in 1884. The meadow was made on prairie land that was covered with sage-brush. Boughton had two railroad rails fastened together in an A shape, and the outer edge sharpened; and it took sixteen horses to pull it, cutting off all sage-brush and leveling the high spots. After that big job was done, he built the Boughton Canal and soon started to apply water to the virgin land. It was not long until the ranch was yielding two thousand tons of hay. During the early 1890's Boughton sold the place to John Whitaker and after a heavy loss from the cattle-killing winter of 1899, the place was sold to John C. Coble and Frank Bosler, Sr. In about 1903 Mr. Coble sold his interest to Mr. Bosler and after his death the ranch passed into the hands of his widow. In due course of time she sold it to Wallis Brothers. With a partner, the Wallis family continues to operate there.

Bring your car, your family and friends, some water or other beverage, and be at the Albany County Court House Square a few minutes before 7 a.m. on Sunday, July 17, 1960. The tour will depart promptly at 7:00 after a few instructions. The rate of speed is fixed at 50 miles per hour on Highways 30 and 34, and 30 to 40 miles per hour on the intermediate roads. Keep a safe distance between the cars, especially on the highways so that the fast oncoming traffic can duck in to keep out of the lane of the eastbound cars. The tour is not as long as many we have made. The distance will be 164 miles. If we stay on schedule we will return at 5:30 p.m.

The ranchmen on this route welcome the tour and will give some history of their ranches. They are, however, fearful of fire so take every precaution in smoking, or better, do not smoke, and if you do, grind every stub in the dirt. PLEASE do not flip the stubs out of the car window, but put them in the ash tray.

On a previous tour a very embarrassing incident occurred at one of the stops. A man was seen carrying an armful of branding irons from a building to his car. He was politely told to return them to the place he found them, which he did, but the owner was short of several irons. The man was picking up souvenirs and did not realize he was doing any harm. We are asking that no one pick up souvenirs unless permission of the owner has been obtained. The articles may look worthless, but at the same time they have a value to the ranchman or they would not have been left there.
